

# PREFACE

This clan documents the ancestors of Barclay Harding Warburton I to IV. It traces the line back to the marriage of Henry Warburton and Martha Sanders at Oxford, England in 1742. The origins of Henry and Martha have yet to be uncovered, as have the records of their deaths which might give a clue to their dates of birth, if their ages at death are recorded.

Information on the Barclay Harding Warburton families in the USA, primarily Philadelphia, is mainly taken from Wikepedia entries, supported by some online records. There is available information on branches of the family that remained in England, but this has yet to be added to the tree.

The Barclay Harding Warburton name came to my attention through the story that links the socialite Mary Brown Warburton to the naming of the Bloody Mary cocktail.

#### **First Generation**

#### 1. Henry Warburton.

This clan is named after the four generations of Barclay Harding Warburtons that appear in the Philadelphia branch of the clan.

Nothing has been found for Henry of Martha prior to their marriage, but as they wee described as lodgers on their marriage they probably came from elsewhere. No death records have yet been found. Their age at death would give a pointer to their dates of birth.

On 10 Sep 1742 Henry married **Martha Sanders** in Oxford, St Mary Magdalen, Oxfordshire. Henry and Martha were both described as lodgers in this parish. They were married with Banns.

- i. **Thomas Warburton**. Thomas was born in Oxford, Oxfordshire, in 1743. He was christened in Oxford, St Giles, Oxfordshire, on 28 Jan 1744.
- ii. **Martha Warburton**. Martha was born in Oxford, Oxfordshire, in 1747. She was christened in Oxford, St Giles, Oxfordshire, on 25 Sep 1747.
- iii. **Henry Warburton**. Henry was born in Oxford, Oxfordshire, in 1750. He was christened in Oxford, St Giles, Oxfordshire, on 15 Mar 1751.
- iv. **John Warburton**. John was born in Oxford, Oxfordshire, in 1753. He was christened in Oxford, St Giles, Oxfordshire, on 12 Nov 1753.
  - John was baptised at home.

### **Second Generation**

**2. George Warburton** (*Henry*<sup>1</sup>). George was born in Oxford, Oxfordshire, in 1754. He was christened in Oxford, St Giles, Oxfordshire, on 30 Oct 1754.

George was baptised at home, and brought to church on November 19th.

On 24 Sep 1786 when George was 32, he married **Mary Davis** in Oxford, St Martin, Oxfordshire. George was from the parish of St Giles, and Mary was from 'this parish'. Mary was born in Cumnor, Berkshire, abt 1770. Census for Leamington Priors, Warwickshire, in 1841. Mary (70) is living in Grove Street with Elizabeth (20) a schoolmistress. Census for Leamington Priors, Warwickshire, in 1851. Mary (80) is a widowed mother-in-law living at 9 Grove Street with Thomas Cory Adams (48) a retired schoolmaster, Elizabeth (48) a schoolmistress, Hannah Carter (50) a widow described as Thomas's sister-in-law, and a servant. Mary died in Leamington Priors, Warwickshire, in 1853. She was buried in Leamington Priors, All Saints, Warwickshire, on 30 Nov 1853.

Mary'sdeath was registered in 4q 1853 Warwick 6d 283, aged 83. She was also 83 on her burial record. This means she was 16 when she married George who was twice her age.

- i. **Martha Warburton**. Martha was born in Oxford, Oxfordshire, in 1790. She was christened in Oxford, St Giles, Oxfordshire, on 26 May 1790.
- ii. **Ann Warburton**. Ann was born in Oxford, Oxfordshire, in 1791. She was christened in Oxford, St Giles, Oxfordshire, on 16 Oct 1791.
- iii. **George Henry Warburton**. George Henry was born in Oxford, Oxfordshire, in 1794. He was christened in Oxford, St Giles, Oxfordshire, on 5 Jan 1795.
  - George married and appeared in censuses but there is no evidence of children.
- iv. **Hannah Warburton**. Hannah was born in Oxford, Oxfordshire, in 1797. She was christened in Oxford, St Giles, Oxfordshire, on 1 Oct 1797.
- v. **Elizabeth Warburton**. Elizabeth was born in Oxford, Oxfordshire, in 1800. She was christened in Oxford, St Giles, Oxfordshire, on 13 Jul 1800.
- vi. William Warburton. William was born in Oxford, Oxfordshire, in 1803.
  - In the 1851 census William is living in Broughton, Lancashire with his wife, 3 sons, 3 daughters, and his unmarried brother Thomas P. The line has been developed on Ancestry Public Trees.
- vii. Thomas Piedwell Warburton. Thomas Piedwell was born in Oxford,

Oxfordshire, in 1805. He was christened in Oxford, St Giles, Oxfordshire, on 3 Nov 1805.

- viii. **Edward Andrew Warburton**. Edward Andrew was born in Oxford, Oxfordshire, in 1808. He was christened in Oxford, St Giles, Oxfordshire, on 15 Mar 1808.
  - In the 1861 census Edward is a Butler in Wall, Staffordshire, accompanied by his wife. An Ancestry Public Tree shows 3 daughters.
- **3** ix. **John Warburton** (1811-1877)
  - x. Charles Warburton. Charles was born in Oxford, Oxfordshire, in 1816. He was christened in Oxford, St Giles, Oxfordshire, on 18 Sep 1816. Charles died in Philadelphia, PA, on 9 Apr 1849. He was buried on 11 Apr 1849.

Pennsylvania and New Jersey Church and Town records show Charles died of an effusion on the brain, he was unmarried, and a native of England. He had sailed from Liverpool to New York, arriving on 30th April 1845.

#### **Third Generation**

**3. John Warburton** (*George*<sup>2</sup>, *Henry*<sup>1</sup>). John was born in Oxford, Oxfordshire, in 1811. He was christened in Oxford, St Giles, Oxfordshire, on 11 Apr 1811. ■ Census for Philadelphia, PA, in 1850. John (37) was living in Pine Ward with Barbara Jane (36), Barbara JE (17), Charles Edwin (16), John George (13), Emly Ann (11), and Bridget Cochran (21). ■ Census for Philadelphia, PA, in 1870. John (59) was a Gent living with Barbara J (58). John died in Philadelphia, PA, on 14 Jul 1877. He was buried in Philadelphia, St James the Less Episcopal Churchyard, PA.

The passenger list for the Theridan, arriving in New York in April (date obscured) 1841 lists: Jno Warburton aged 30, BJ Warburton aged 28, B Warburton aged 7, Charles Warburton aged 6 and John Warburton aged 3. Emily is not mentioned, but she is present in the 1850 census.

The Philadelphia Inquirer. 17 July 1877 Obituary

John Warburton.

On the morning of the 14th instant Mr. John Warburton, a respected citizen of Philadelphia, died at his residence, No. 251 South Seventeenth street, in the sixty-sixth year of his age. Mr. Warburton was born in England in the year 1810. He came to Philadelphia in 1837, and entered into the silk and millinery goods business on South Second street, at a time when that thoroughfare was the fashionable street for retail sales.

The leading retail dry goods stores were then upon that street. When the tide of business moved westward, Mr. Warburton removed to No. 1002 Chestnut street, where he remained for upward of twelve years. About ten years ago he retired with a handsome competence, and has since that time been leading a quiet life. His health has been gradually failing, but his mind remained clear to the last.

He leaves a wife and daughter and an only son, Mr. Charles E. Warburton, the publisher of the Evening Telegraph. He was a man of strict integrity and careful business habits, and to this much of his success can be attributed. His charity was unostentatious, but he always had a kind ear and liberal hand for the suffering or sorrowing. His funeral takes place from his late residence, No. 264 South Seventeenth street, this afternoon at three o'clock."

John's gravestone states he was born in Oxford, England.

On 6 Mar 1832 when John was 21, he married Barbara Jane Abell in Cheltenham,

Gloucestershire. Both John and Barbara were 'of this parish'. Barbara Jane was born in Leamington Spa, Warwickshire, on 17 Jun 1811. Barbara Jane died in Delaware Co., PA, on 25 Jul 1888. She was buried in Philadelphia, St James the Less Episcopal Churchyard, PA.

The Philadelphia Inquirer. 26 July 1888:

Mrs. Barbara J. Warburton, widow of the late John Warburton, died yesterday morning, aged 77 years, while sojourning with her son, Mr. Charles E. Warburton, proprietor of the Evening Telegraph, at his summer residence, Rosemont, in Delaware County. Mrs. Warburton possessed in a high degree those admirable qualities of mind and heart that endeared her to all who knew her."

- i. **Barbara Jane Elizabeth Warburton**. Barbara Jane Elizabeth was born abt 1833. She was christened in Tewkesbury, Gloucestershire, on 26 Feb 1833.
- 4 ii. Charles Edward Warburton (1836-1896)
  - iii. John George Warburton. John George was born in 1836. He was christened in Liverpool, St Peter and St Nicholas, Lancashire, on 13 Nov 1836. John George died bef 1877.
    - From his father's obituary it would seem that John predeceased him.
  - iv. **Emily Ann Burgess Warburton**. Emily Ann Burgess was born abt 1839. She was christened in Leamington, All Saints, Warwickshire, on 8 Dec 1839.
    - Emily's birth was registered in 3q 1839, Warwick 16 481, mother's maiden name Abell. Her father was a draper from Leamington on her baptism record.

#### **Fourth Generation**

**4. Charles Edward Warburton** (*John*<sup>3</sup>, *George*<sup>2</sup>, *Henry*<sup>1</sup>). Charles Edward was born in Leamington Spa, Warwickshire, on 2 Mar 1836. He was christened in Leamington, All Saints, Warwickshire, on 8 Dec 1939. ■ Census for Philadelphia, PA, in 1880. C.E. (43) is an editor living at 2201 St James Place with Mary B (38), Mary G (16), B.H. (14), and C.E. Jr (12). Charles Edward died in Atlantic City, NJ, on 1 Sep 1896. He was buried in Philadelphia, St James the Less Episcopal Churchyard, PA.

Charles was baptised the same day as his sister Emily. His father was a draper from Leamington on his baptism record.

Charles was the publisher of the Philadelphia Evening Telegraph, having started at the paper in 1864.

Although various on-line sources say he was born in Philadelphia, his 1880 census entry says he was born in England. In fact his family arrived in New York in 1841, though Charles's passport applications suggest he was unclear on the details.

Charles E. made 2 passport applications. The first was issued on May 20th 1880. He stated he was born on 2nd March 1836 in Leamington, and had resided in Philadelphia since he was 3 years of age. He was naturalised in the Court of Common Pleas on May 19th 1880. He was to travel abroad with his daughter Mary B Warburton, aged 15, and visit Great Britain, Ireland, France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, Switzerland, Italy and Austria. He was described as aged 44, 5 ft 71/2 inches, with blue eyes, a round face, grey hair, large nose, and a small mouth.

The second was issued on July 10th 1891. He stated he was born on 2nd March 1837 in Learnington, arrived in the US in 1839 and had resided in Philadelphia since that time. He was a Publisher and intended to return to the US about October 1st 1891.

His entry on <u>findagrave.com</u> states he was found dead in bed by a nurse. It was unexpected though he had been afflicted for some time with heart trouble.

Charles Edward married **Mary Bell Gallagher**. Mary Bell was born in Philadelphia, PA, on 27 Nov 1839. Mary Bell died in Philadelphia, PA, on 11 Dec 1886. She was buried in Philadelphia, St James the Less Episcopal Churchyard, PA.

It was reported the Mary died suddenly.

Fourth Generation

#### They had the following children:

i. **Mary Warburton**. Mary was born in Philadelphia, PA, on 27 Aug 1864. Mary died in Philadelphia, PA, on 1 Aug 1951. She was buried in Philadelphia, St James the Less Episcopal Churchyard, PA.

Mary married **William Howard Pancoast**. William Howard was born on 24 Oct 1873. William Howard died on 7 Oct 1943.

- 5 ii. Barclay Harding Warburton (1866-1954)
  - iii. **Charles E Warburton**. Charles E was born in Philadelphia, PA, on 22 Mar 1867. Charles E died in Philadelphia, PA, on 21 Nov 1882.

Charles is only known from his death certificate and grave record. he died of peritonitis following a perforated appendix.

#### **Fifth Generation**

**5. Barclay Harding Warburton** (*Charles Edward*<sup>4</sup>, *John*<sup>3</sup>, *George*<sup>2</sup>, *Henry*<sup>1</sup>). Barclay Harding was born in Philadelphia, PA, on 1 Apr 1866. Barclay Harding died in Philadelphia, PA, on 5 Dec 1954. He was buried in Philadelphia, St James the Less Episcopal Churchyard, PA.

It would seem Barclay was named after his father's co-publisher of the Philadelphia Evening Telegraph, James Barclay Harding. He succeeded his father as publisher of the Telegraph.

During the Spanish-American War Barclay commanded Light Battery A of the Pennsylvania Artillery during the Puerto Rico Campaign. He was charge d'affairs for President Wilson in London in 1914–1917, and become one of General Pershing's aides-de-camp in Paris in 1917.

In 1921 he was named as the Special Police Commissioner for Philadelphia He was elected Mayor of Palm Beach, Florida in 1928, and resigned in 1929 to return to manage the EF Hutton office in Philadelphia.

Barclay was buried in the Wanamaker family Tomb.

Barclay Harding first married **Mary Fleming Smith**. Mary Fleming was born in New Jersey, NJ, on 17 Aug 1867. Mary Fleming died in Philadelphia, PA, on 30 Apr 1889. She was buried in New Dorp (Statten Island), Moravian Cemetery, NY.

Mary (Kitty) was the daughter of Col. Richard Penn Smith and Lucy Piper Woods. She died of peritonitis at 22 years of age.

Barclay Harding second married **Mary Brown Wanamaker**. Mary Brown was born in Philadelphia, PA, on 5 May 1871. Mary Brown died in Philadelphia, PA, on 17 Nov 1954. She was buried in Philadelphia, St James the Less Episcopal Churchyard, PA.

Mary was an American social and political leader. She was was a daughter of U.S. Postmaster General John Wanamaker. and the first woman to head the Pennsylvania Republican Committee.

She was buried in the Wanamaker Family Tomb.

#### They had the following children:

i. Mary Brown Warburton. Mary Brown was born in Wyncote, Montgomery Co., PA, on 16 Aug 1896. Mary Brown died in Manhattan, NY, on 12 Sep 1937. She was buried in Philadelphia, St James the Less Episcopal Churchyard, PA.

The Bloody Mary

American actor George Jessel claimed to have invented the Bloody Mary in Palm Beach in 1927. He was in desperate need of a quick fix for a hangover when a bartender suggested vodka. Jessel claims he mixed it with tomato juice, lemon, and Worcestershire to kill the smell and called it a Bloody Mary after socialite Mary Brown Warburton, went to take a sip and spilled it all over her white dress. According to Jessel's autobiography she laughed and said, "Now you can call me Bloody Mary, George!".

Mary was buried in the Wanamaker Family Tomb.

#### **Sixth Generation**

**6. Barclay Harding Warburton II** (*Barclay Harding*<sup>5</sup>, *Charles Edward*<sup>4</sup>, *John*<sup>3</sup>, *George*<sup>2</sup>, *Henry*<sup>1</sup>). Barclay Harding was born in Philadelphia, PA, on 15 Jun 1898. Barclay Harding died in Doylestown, Bucks Co., PA, on 26 Nov 1936. He was buried in Philadelphia, St James the Less Episcopal Churchyard, PA.

Barclay Harding Warburton II was an American socialite, farmer, aviator, and member of the Hoover Commission in Poland. He was also an assistant director at 20th Century Fox.

He was the first American to serve at the Ecole Militaire Saint Cyr. Both he and his father were serving in Paris at the same time, and he is known to have remarked to his father, "You've got to get me out of here; we are still training on horses, and you know I want to fly." (Which he later did).

In 1922 he received his Royal Aero Club certificate from the Grahame-White school of flying. In 1930 he announced plans to fly solo around the world, but isn't recorded to have done so.

On June 27, 1936, he set off a firework that exploded in his face.

He died after a hunting accident on November 26, 1936. He said that his shotgun had accidentally fired while he was climbing a fence while hunting for pheasant at his Saracen Farm near Doylestown, PA. He survived long enough to make it back to the house, and was taken to the hospital.

Barclay is buried in the Wanamaker Family Tomb.

On 10 Dec 1919 when Barclay Harding was 21, he first married **Rosemary Lancaster** in Elkton, MA. Barclay and Rosemary were divorced in 1926. Rosemary was born in Worcester, MA, on 19 Apr 1897. Rosemary died in Centerport, Suffolk Co., NY, on 28 Aug 1947. She was buried in New Dorp, Vanderbilt Family Cemetery and Mausoleum, NY.

#### They had the following children:

 Rosemary Warburton. Rosemary was born in Paris, France, on 11 Sep 1920.
 Rosemary died in Paris, France, on 27 Jul 1974. She was buried in Philadelphia, St James the Less Episcopal Churchyard, PA.

Socialite, Heiress, Mrs. Hugh Chisholm, was a well known society figure who was active in charity work, She had homes in America and in France.

Mrs. Chisholm, the former Rosemary Warburton, was the daughter of the late Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt Jr. of Northport, RI, and New York and the late Barclay H. Warburton Jr. of Philadelphia. For four years, ending in 1957, she was chairman of the April in Paris Ball, held at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel. Mrs. Chisholm also served as national chairman of the Embassy.

Her first marriage to Dr. William C. T. Gaynor, ended in divorce in 1957. During her second marriage to the late Hugh J. Chisholm Jr., she was active in charity affairs. In 1958, she and Mr. Chisholm sold their 60-acre estate on Millstone Brook Road, Southampton, N.Y., to Adelphi College.

Rosemary first married **Dr William Charles Thomas Gaynor**. William Charles Thomas was born in New York, NY, on 9 Jun 1911. William Charles Thomas died in Venice, Saratosa Co., FL, on 20 Jun 1999. He was buried in Southampton Cemetery, Suffolk Co., NY.

Rosemary second married **Hugh Joseph Chisholm III**. Hugh Joseph was born in New York, NY, on 20 Jul 1913. Hugh Joseph died in Paris, France, on 13 Nov 1972. He was buried in Portland, Evergreen Cemetery, Maine.

**8** ii. **Barclay Harding Warburton III** (1922-1983)

Barclay Harding second married **Evelyn Hall Pierce**. Evelyn Hall was born in Rye, Westchester Co., NY, on 25 Nov 1904. Evelyn Hall died in Englewood, Bergen Co., NY, on 30 Sep 1967. She was buried in Southampton Cemetery, Suffolk Co., NY.

Evelyn was previously married, and was the daughter of Charles E McManus of Rye, NY.

**7. Charles Egerton Warburton** (*Barclay Harding*<sup>5</sup>, *Charles Edward*<sup>4</sup>, *John*<sup>3</sup>, *George*<sup>2</sup>, *Henry*<sup>1</sup>). Charles Egerton was born in Philadelphia, PA, on 12 Feb 1902. Charles Egerton died in Bryn Mawr, Montgomery Co., PA, on 9 Jan 1973. He was buried in Bryn Mawr, Church or the Redeemer Cemetery, Montgomery Co., PA.

Charles Egerton first married **Mary Louise Hatch**. Mary Louise was born in Philadelphia, PA, on 9 Mar 1911. Mary Louise died in Pittsburgh, PA, on 22 Jun 1939. She was buried in Pittsburgh, Allegheny Cemetery, PA.

Charles Egerton second married **Jane Alldred**. Jane was born in New York, NY, on 25 Mar 1916. Jane died in Bryn Mawr, Montgomery Co., PA, on 23 Jun 1988.

After Charles's death Jane married Peter Hallaran. Her children are only known from her obituary which states she also had 7 grandchildren.

**8. Barclay Harding Warburton III** (*Barclay Harding*<sup>6</sup>, *Barclay Harding*<sup>5</sup>, *Charles Edward*<sup>4</sup>, *John*<sup>3</sup>, *George*<sup>2</sup>, *Henry*<sup>1</sup>). Barclay Harding was born in Philadelphia, PA, on 5 Feb 1922. Barclay Harding died in Newport, RI, on 1 May 1983.

**Barclay Harding Warburton III** or Buzz, Buzzy, or Buzzie to his close friends, was the founder of the American Sail Training Association.

He became a step-son of William Kissam Vanderbilt II, and a step-nephew of Harold Stirling Vanderbilt, when his mother Rosamund remarried.

Barclay graduated from Harvard University in 1948, and served in the Massachusetts House of Representatives as a representative from the 2nd Essex district. He was a member of the Agriculture committee and the Marine Fisheries Committee.

He and his wife Margrett purchased the 140-acre Mosley place in Ipswich, MA., and renamed it Saracen Farm. They turned it in to an organic dairy farm milking 50 head of Golden Guernseys. When Buzz and Margie divorced in 1959 the farm was sold to the Catholic Church.

Buzz purchased the 72 ft brigantine *Black Pearl* and set off around the world. Halfway to Panama better senses got hold of him and he returned to the Bahamas, where he settled in at Lyford Cay and built several houses by Clifton Dock.

In 1964, he participated in the OPSAIL 64 and decided sail training was for him. From then on the *Black Pearl* was no longer the yacht *Black Pearl*, but rather the sail training ship *Black Pearl*.

When the Bahamas gained independence Buzz went up to Newport, RI and started the Black Pearl restaurant, remarking at the time, "well we need someplace decent to eat". The Black Pearl was never a financial success for Buzz, but it got him a huge amount of recognition and he had every folk singer and blue grass picker in the place every weekend. Nonetheless, the restaurant is one of Newport's most famous and longest established restaurants.

By 1972, he readied the boat for a transatlantic passage, starting with a shakedown cruise to the Virgin Islands. In late May the *Black Pearl* left for England with 14 crew and after 23 days arrived at the Lizard. Travelling through Europe that summer with the tall ships he earned much praise and recognition. The British Sail Training Association (STA) asked him to start

an American STA and become its chairman, which he did.

The 1976 Tall Ships was a great success and really put Newport on the map. Buzz sold the Black Pearl Restaurant to Tom Cullen but kept a royalty for the use of the name.

However, Buzz is most known for founding the American Sail Training Association which was inspired by his many travels under the power of wind to Europe and elsewhere.

Buzz died on May 1, 1983. His ashes were scattered at sea of Newport RI. He was survived by his second wife; five children from his first marriage; a stepdaughter; and five grandchildren.

In 1947 when Barclay Harding was 24, he married **Margrett Mckean**. Buzz and Margie divorced in 1959.

Margrett was from Pride's Crossing, MA.

**9. Barclay Harding Warburton IV** (Barclay Harding<sup>7</sup>, Barclay Harding<sup>6</sup>, Barclay Harding<sup>5</sup>, Charles Edward<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, George<sup>2</sup>, Henry<sup>1</sup>).

**Barclay Harding Warburton IV** was known as Tim. He attended Le Rosey School, St Andrews School, Hyde School, and Boston University. He served with the US Merchant Marine during the Vietnam War, making 2 Pacific crossings in 1968, and then served in the United States Navy (1968–1970) as navigator.

He was the founder of the Connecticut River Valley Boatworks in 1972, which became the Vermont Oak Company in 1976 specialising in high-quality oak, walnut, and cherry furniture.

In 1984 he joined with Brook Phillips Lacour to pioneer the villa vacation model as an alternative to staying in hotels beginning in St. Barthelemy as an owner of West Indies Management Company (WIMCO Villas and Hotels), headquartered in Newport, with the purpose of renting vacation homes in prime locations while not occupied by their owners. This proved successful, and the company quickly moved on to St Martin, Anguilla, Nevis, Barbados, Mustique, and then into the South of France, Italy and Greece, as well as Nantucket, Hawaii, and Mexico.

Tim's love of sailing took him across the Atlantic twice, once as sailing master in 1972, and returning in 1973 as skipper aboard the 72 ft brigantine *Black Pearl*. He sailed with his father regularly, and joined him in Opsail '64, New York, Tall Ships '72, Cowes, Malmo and Travemunde, and then again in '76 from Newport–Bermuda–New York–Boston. He raced as navigator aboard the 65 ft yawl "Nirvana", participating in such events as the 1986 Statue of Liberty celebrations, 1994 New York Yacht Club Sesquicentennial and the 2001 America's Cup Jubilee in Cowes, winning the Antigua Classic Race Week in 2005.

Tim also served as a director of the Newport Music Festival, and the American Sail Training Association (Tall Ships).

In 1986 Barclay Harding married Julie Phillips.

Julie was from Southport, CT.
