Letters from Captain Eliot Warburton MC Concerning at trip to England by 2 Girls from Nazareth College in 1957

Piers Grove Eliot (Eliot) Warburton (1896-1961) is a member of the Garryhinch clan and descended from George Warburton of Aughrim in Ireland He was the second of 3 sons of the clan founder Richard Warburton, a merchant who appeared in Dublin in 1635.

Eliot is the subject of a biography written by his grandson P Richard Warburton (**PGE (ELIOT) Warburton MC: His Life, His Work and His Legacy** by P. Richard Warburton - available on Kindle).

Briefly he fought in WW1, winning the Military Cross at Vimy Ridge, and served in Military Intelligence until 1925. In WW2 he rejoined the Army but in 1942 he was appointed to the office of the High Commissioner in Canada (Ottawa) to promote the British cause amongst the Canadians.

He worked in industry both between the wars, and after 1945. He married Marie Louise Thompson of Winston Salem, North Carolina in 1923. They met when they were both working in Berlin, and had four children.

Mary Louise was educated at Roman Catholic girls boarding school in Nazareth, Kentucky. When she died in 1954 the family presented a memorial crucifix in her honour to the college. Eliot also provided a gift to the college to allow some of the students to travel to the United Kingdom.

It was this gift that allowed two girls, Marian Martin and Harvietta Engelhart, to travel to the UK in 1957.

Recently Marian (now Yeager) sent me a number of letters sent to her by Eliot Warburton, together with her itinerary, and an extract from her diary of the trip. She felt they should be with the Warburton family. I have copied and transcribed the letters, and will then send the materials to Eliot's grandson Richard, who unlike me, is part of the family.

However the story starts with a letter from Marian to her parents which is included in Richard's biography.

Nazareth College Nazareth, KY April 18, 1956

Dear Mama and Daddy

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
This is just a note to let you know the good news. Captain Warburton, the man who gave the trip, wrote Sister Augustine and said it would be alright to make the trip next year if not possible this year. I think I could work this summer to make some money and it would work out alright. Harvey also feels it would be possible for her to go next year, and so we have been busy dreaming about it....Sister is looking up some tours to the British Isles that I might take. I think it would be wonderful to go next summer after I have finished school.

Sister Augustine really wants me to go, She says she wants someone "representative of the school" (ahem) and that I was her preference. She says the Warburtons are wonderful people. I have written him (Captain Warburton) as she asked me to and told him how everything stood and asked him if it would be alright for me to come next year even if Ann went ahead this year. Whatever he says will settle it. OK.

When Eliot and his family returned to Britain after the war they took a house in Kew. I don't know if they were still there when this letter was written in 1956,

I also don't know if Ann Mabory (name unclear) ever made the trip, but there is no further mention of her.

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The following undated letter to Sister Augustine must have followed shortly after.

I had not intended to make any stipulations about the trip to Britain. I said "two" girls, because I thought it would be better that there should be two. They would probably join one of the tours arranged for young people, which try to show them a fair amount of the country — but it is a mistake to rush wildly all over the place: if they can pick a tour that concentrates on the South — say London, Windsor, Cambridge, Oxford; Stratford-on-Avon, with Warwick, Kenilworth, Bath and Wells; Marlborough with Avebury; Salisbury with Old Sarum, Stonehenge and Wilton, Winchester and Canterbury, that will be as much as mortals can digest at one go! I hope they can arrange to spend a few days with us, too.

That was a nice letter from Marian Martin, and I am entirely happy about her plans. Annette and I will look forward to hearing in good time when to expect hermand Harvietta Engelhart in 1957. . . I might be able to plan the trip if I am told how much money is available after paying the fares both ways. I know England, especially the South, fairly well.




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This letter was probably sent from his daughter Patricia's home. She had remained in the USA after the family returned to England after WW2, and had married Sandy Dunscombe in 1947.

Eliot rented Kings Worthy Court, near Winchester from 1956 until 1960. After his wife died, and his children moved away, he needed to downsize. He shared the house with Sir Leonard Woolley, who was also a widower, and who was knighted in 1935 for his services to archeology.

Eliot left King's Worth in 1960 when Sir Leonard died, and he remarried to Barbara Coke (pronounced Cook)

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Tuesday 6th August was the date of the following extract from Marian's diary of the trip.

Tuesday August 6, 1957

We got up at 10 and went to Mrs. Benner's at Stanmore for lunch. We met a German or Bavarian countess today. The lunch at Mrs. Benner's was excellent. Poor Harvi dropped sherry all over herself and later lost a button off her skirt and spilled a tomato sandwich and her tea! We toured beautiful Hatfield House while with Mrs.Benner.

Later we met Capt. Warburton at the R.A.C. Club for dinner along with his American friend, a doctor fron New York. (On the way there, we asked for directions to the R. C. A. Club!) When Capt. Warburton arrived he noticed Harvi looked distressed. He asked her what the problem was, and she told him she had lost the button on her skirt. He proceeded to put his foot on a chair, reached up his pant leg, and pulled out a saftey pin and gave it to her. He said and I quote: "That will teach you American ladies that English gentlemen are quite resouceful!" After dinner Capt. Warburton took us to the theater to see "Oh Mapapa!" which was wonderful! He brought us back to the hotel around 10. { We almost ran into a cab! } We met a Lady Heath at the theater also. She was a widow and friend of Capt. Warburton.

During the night I was so sick. It was no wonder though as I had eaten 2 candy bars, ham, potatoes, tomato sandwiches, salad, jellied consomme (ugh), and ice cream roll plus I had raspberry coke, sherry, tea, champagne, orange squash and coffee to drink! Is it any wonder? This is in addition to the nice meal at the R.A.C. Club. {(I spilled 2 green peas off my plate at the club with Capt. W. and his friend. Green peas rolled across the white linen tablecloth towards the doctor!!! I was so embarrassed!)


